Ignite is a not-for-profit, student-run, and student-led organisation that has been involved with the Dunedin community for 14 remarkable years, providing free business advice and strategic planning to charities. We help clients overcome obstacles and achieve their aspirations through harnessing students' fresh perspectives and supporting them in a way to unleash this.

Our organisation is led by five key values, community, impact, diversity, innovation and mutual benefit. This year we can again say that we've lived up to that mission. The year 2023 can be encapsulated in a single, powerful word: Growth. Ignite's journey has been one of forging new connections, establishing new partnerships, and fortifying existing ones.

First, a note on our consultants, the heart and soul of Ignite Trust. Their passion, commitment, and unwavering belief in the power of positive change have made this year a resounding success. Our consultants are chosen for their creativity, leadership skills and entrepreneurial ability. This year was no different and we were again fortunate to receive a high number of applications, ultimately accepting 54 students who we felt truly embodied the values of Ignite. Our students came from science, law, arts, commerce and master's degrees, spanning first years to fifth years, all with the intention to volunteer their time to help build a more socially conscious future.

This year Ignite Dunedin was fortunate enough to work with the largest number of groups that we have worked with in many years.

The projects included:

- * Te Hou Ora Whānau Services
- * Dunedin City Pipe Band
- * Diving Ōtākou
- * Taste Nature Social Enterprise
- * The Wellness Gym
- * Give to Grow Ōtepoti
- * Happy You Theatre Trust

In each project, the teams were made up of five to six student consultants, one project manager who is a member of the Ignite Executive, and one mentor from the wider Dunedin community who worked together to guide the students through their consulting journey. In 2023 we were fortunate to receive mentorship from Sebastian Gehricke, Tony Garry, Deborah Manning and Kyle Cameron.

Across these projects were those that Ignite refers to as "standard 8 weeks projects" "combustion weekend projects" and "implementation projects." A standard 8-week project refers to one that includes both the identification and resolution of an organisation's pain point, while the combustion project covers the same content yet takes place in a condensed format of one weekend. In comparison, an 'implementation project' is a more hands-on approach, taking one year to complete. This first semester of work follows a 'standard 8-week project timeline before the consultants adopt the earlier recommendations and transition into becoming actively involved with the organisation in the second semester.

An example of a standout yearlong success story is that of Give to Grow Ötepoti. In short, over the year Ignite achieved four main objectives: we provided guidance and support for Give to Grow (GTG) in their pursuit of legal status, formed a strategic partnership with Skillsec, established a database for the "Friends of Give to Grow" program, and brought on board two marketing interns for GTG. As of completing the project, and speaking with the clients, we are proud to understand that they were very happy with the work the team put in both in the first semester and during the second semester. The client has expressed a desire to continue to work with Ignite and use the Ignite Network to advertise a governance internship on a future Give to Grow board.

Furthermore, in 2023 Ignite continued to pursue the goal of financial sustainability. Across the year we have been fortunate to continue our relationship with many prior sponsors. These include the Dunedin City Council, the Otago Community Trust, the Department of Internal Affairs, the Rata Foundation and the Southern Trust. Ignite has also grown its sponsorship pool through partnering with Deloitte and Anderson Llyod - partnerships which are not just financial; but are investments into our shared vision of fostering positive change and development within the non-profit sector.

At the conclusion of 2023, Ignite was also delighted to be recognised as a finalist in the Grand Business South Awards, within the community contribution category. This award recognised the outstanding achievements of Dunedin organisations which provided support to various environmental, social or cultural causes within the community. Our nomination alongside large companies such as Life Education Trust - Heartland Otago Southland, Downer NZ and Tühura Otago Museum was an incredible achievement for our small NFP. Although Ignite did not ultimately win the award it was an incredible experience to be a part of.

As we now close the chapter on 2023, Ignite stands ready for the journey ahead, one that holds the promise of more growth, collaboration, and positive change. As the heart and soul of Ignite, our consultants, mentors, sponsors, and the wider community, have collectively propelled us to new heights. Thus, in conclusion, Ignite's endeavours in 2023 embody our commitment to positive change, and we look forward to building on these achievements in the future.

Each charity works with a team of 5-6 consultants, all of which are current university students at Te Herenga Waka – Victoria University of Wellington. We are proud to see our diversity in consultants increasing, in area of study, year of study, and gender. Each team is led by a Project Manager, a fellow student who has previously been a consultant. Each team is then given an external mentor who works within the consulting profession to further support the success of the team.

I would like to thank Ernst and Young, Deloitte, PWC and KPMG, for their continued support in providing mentorship for our consultants. These partnerships have been invaluable, providing our volunteers with great advice in

carrying out their projects. Further, the provision of training days by Deloitte, Ernst and Young, and HuiE! provide our teams with valuable skills both within their capacity as a volunteer consultant and beyond. Our three training days included tips around design thinking, presentation skills, and people skills. We were fortunate to continue to grow and strengthen our relationship with the Victoria University of Wellington. Their support has been a key element to helping Ignite thrive, and the knowledge they have shared with both the executive and consultants has been a great resource for Ignite.

The dedication and mahi of our consultants, executive, and continued support from local businesses over the past year is a testament to the power of collaboration. Seeing the passion for positive change and sense of community all parties shared was exhilarating. Note 1 - Accounting Policies

BASIS OF PREPARATION

Ignite Trust is permitted by law to apply PBE SFR-C (NFP) Public Benefit Entity Simple Format Reporting - Cash (Not-For-Profit) and has elected to do so. All transactions are reported in the Statement of Receipts and Payments and related Notes to the Report on a cash basis.

GOODS AND SERVICES TAX (GST)

Ignite Trust is registered for GST. Where applicable, amounts recorded in the Performance Report are exclusive of GST. GST owing, or GST refunds due as at balance date are shown in the Statement of Resources and Commitments.

CHANGE OF BALANCE DATE

During the year Ignite Trust elected to change it's balance date from 31 March to 31 December. This decision was made to better align Ignite's reporting period to operations and the tenure period of the Executive. Consequently, Ignite is reporting current year figures as the period of 9 months ended 31 December 2023. Comparatives remain at the full 12 month period of 1 April 2022 to 31 March 2023. Future Performance Reports will be reported on a full 12 month period, from 1 January to 31 December.
